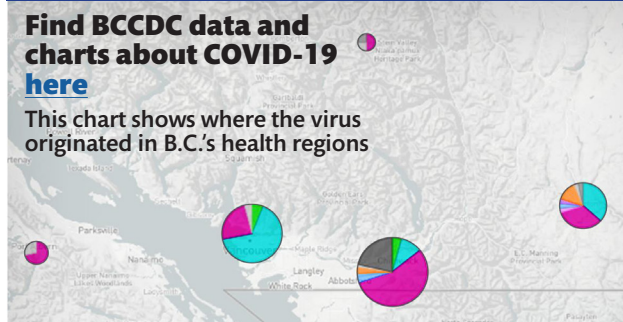
In terms of safety measures – the majority of drivers are older people – I would like a plexiglass barrier. Things have changed drastically on buses. The new rules are that kids use hand sanitizers as they step up on the bus. They cannot open their backpacks, eat on the bus, or touch the windows. I tell them, "You have to pretend you are a rock and all you can do is talk."

When we get to one of our schools, I unload the entire bus from the front to the back so no-one is passing each other. I tell them to keep six feet between each other. I spray sanitize all the seats and wipe them down before reloading the kids in the correct order for the next school.

Everything about education is for the kids. All the bus drivers I know love their jobs and enjoy working with youth. I love driving. There is a bond between bus drivers and their regular load of kids. ■
